A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT INVESTING IN OUR STUDENTS' FUTURE: PROPOSED 2025–26 BUDGET INCLUDES 1.96% TAX INCREASE

Dear Members of the Allegany-Limestone Community,

The proposed 2025-26 school budget reflects our continued commitment to providing high-quality education, maintaining safe and modern facilities, and supporting student success across all grade levels. To achieve these goals, we are proposing a 1.96% increase in the local tax levy.

This modest increase will help preserve and enhance a wide range of academic and extracurricular programs that define our district's excellence. From early literacy initiatives and STEM enrichment to college and career readiness programs, we remain focused on equipping our students with the tools they need to thrive in an everchanging world. While we are grateful for the support we



the support we receive from the state, increases in state aid have remained limited and are not sufficient to keep pace with rising costs. As a result, local funding remains a critical source of support for our schools.

We believe this budget strikes a responsible balance—investing in the future of our students while remaining mindful of the impact on taxpayers. We encourage all residents to review the full budget proposal and participate in the upcoming budget vote.



Tony Giannicchi Superintendent of Schools The annual \$100k Capital Outlay Project can be included by school districts as part of the annual budget process. This process benefits the taxpayers, as it allows for annual maintenance that needs to be addressed, and utilizes the cycle of "funds-out" in one year and "funds-in" the following year (via State Aid) to essentially pay for the majority of the next year's project, as long as this cycle is maintained.

The 2025-2026 Capital Outlay Project is comprised of kitchen upgrades to include a criticallyneeded replacement of the walk-in cooler at the elementary for food storage, in conjunction with electrical and mechanical, as well as flooring and doors.



The District Vote takes place on May 20, 2025.

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

Shall the following resolution be adopted?

RESOLVED, that the budget for the Allegany-Limestone Central School District, Cattaraugus, New York, for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2026, as presented by the Board of Education, is hereby approved and adopted and the required funds therefore are hereby appropriated and the necessary real property taxes required shall be collected by a tax on the taxable property in said District to be levied as required by law.

Voter Eligibility and Voting Location

- Registered voters over the age of 18 who have been residents of the district for at least 30 days are eligible to vote
- District Residents vote in the Allegany-Limestone Middle-High School Gym

Many who have never been away from home for more than a few nights nor traveled on a plane had signed up to travel across the ocean to countries they have only seen through pictures and videos. At the Buffalo Airport we met up with a group of eight from our neighboring district, Ellicottville.

These students were people our Gators may have competed against on the fields and courts, but after 12 days would be friends that were a big part of core memories that were created.

Tired and nervous, we landed in Amsterdam and waited for our flight to Madrid, Spain. Once we arrived at our first actual destination, the excitement and reality canceled out the apprehension and caution. Two quick days in Madrid and Toledo gave us a taste of a large city and an ancient walled city safely on top of a hill learning about art and history. Language barriers became less of a concern and more of a celebration when they went well. Not to get too comfortable, the rapid train to Barcelona took us a few hours northeast of Spain to





a new city with its own language and story to spend two more days learning about architecture and tourism and the blending of cultures and languages. Some students experienced a Barcelona vs Palmas fútbol match in the Olympic Stadium while others experienced Las Ramblas, the pathway from the center of Barcelona to the Mediterranean Sea.

Just as we settled into Barcelona, two days later, it was time to board a flight to Nice, France. The halfway point of our trip was met with a 2-day quiet visit to the Cote d' Azure, named for the brilliant blue waters and rocky beaches of the coastline. We lived like locals visiting the Christmas market, the local parks, bike rides, and quiet restaurants not very busy due to the off season. A picnic on the beach with our new and old friends, making plans to come back some day. The quiet visit quickly came to an end after two days, as we boarded the bus for the last legs of our trip, Italy. The country where neither the Spanish nor French students would be able to take

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the lead. The country that many were most excited about, but cautiously optimistic about using the language-barrier skills we had picked up over the past six days.

Italy showed us the iconic Leaning Tower of Pisa. The brilliant white buildings next to the greenest grass and bluest sky. A quick stop for the traditional pictures of holding up the tower. Then we arrived to Florence, Italy to soak in the art, the history, and the food. The best food. Suddenly everyone forgot that no one spoke Italian, and the uncertainty once again disappeared. Two quick days in Florence, and then off to Rome, the pinnacle of the trip, only after an excursion to Assisi. We learned about the connection to this area of Italy that is particularly near and dear to our hearts as we have such a strong connection to St. Bonaventure University. Some

religious education and art history were on the agenda in this beautiful area of Italy. Exhausted from the bus travel, we woke up to the massive Colosseum lit up in the evening lights as we arrived at our hotel only one block away. This was the image so many had been



waiting for. The sudden burst of energy to finish the trip on a high note became just what we needed. Rome was not built in a day, but it was explored by this group in a day. We fit in the Colosseum, the Roman Forum, the Vatican, and the Pantheon. We were able to get just enough of a visit to Rome that we felt comfortable enough to know that we can and need to come back another day. If this sounds appealing to the students of Allegany-Limestone, know that we travel every two years around Thanksgiving break. Our next trip – November 2026 – is in the planning and approving stage, and we are hoping to announce the next itinerary which will have Paris (France), Madrid and Sevilla (Spain), and Lisbon (Portugal). Start saving now, the trip will hopefully be launched for signups before June.

atural Helpers is a high school peer helping program that focuses on the natural helping network teens form to support each other. Counselor Mrs. Bogart has been the Natural Helpers advisor since our first retreat training took place in 1993. This year 37 new students were trained to become Natural Helpers, bringing our current total to 89 students in grades 9-12. The training took place at Camp Allegany in March. Students were trained on the steps of the helping skill, the importance of taking good care of themselves as well as focusing on ways to break down labels to improve the school community. Students really





appreciated the chance to meet new people and get to know them better, even people you would have never thought to talk to, as well as a chance to make new friends.

In preparation for the training, students in grades 9-12 were surveyed in January asking what the top five concerns students believe are major issues for them and their friends as well as who they try get help from when they have a problem. The top concerns in this year's survey were gossip/rumors, achievement in school, stress, friendships, and mental health. Fifty seven of the students stated they first go to another student when they have a problem. With so many students looking to their friends for help, the Natural Helper network provides a critical role in supporting our students to make healthy choices.
